The Discover Albany Visitors Center is open on a limited basis Thursday through Saturday 10AM to 2 PM. When open, restrooms are available, and parking may be available in the municipal parking lot behind the Visitors Center. Paid public parking on is available on adjacent city streets. It is recommended that you call ahead to verify the Visitors Center is open for availability of restrooms.

DIRECTIONS TO START POINT: Albany is located on the Hudson River approximately 150 miles north of New York City.

From the North: Take I-87 (Adirondack Northway) south to Exit 7. Merge onto NY-7 East via Exit 7 toward Troy/Cohoes. Take the I-787 South exit towards Albany/Watervliet. Merge onto US-9 North via Exit 4B toward Clinton Ave. At the end of the ramp turn right onto Broadway. Turn right onto Spencer St. Right onto Montgomery St. At the end of the street the municipal parking lot is on your left and the Visitors Center is in the large brick building on your right.

From the South: Take I-87 north to Exit 23. Bear left on exit ramp to I-787 North. Take Exit 4 toward US-9 N/US-20 W, Downtown Albany. Merge onto Quay St. Slight right onto US-9 North towards Clinton Ave. At the end of the ramp turn right onto Broadway. Turn right onto Spencer St. Right onto Montgomery St. At the end of the street the municipal parking lot is on your left and the Visitors Center is in the large brick building on your right.

From the East: Take I-90 west until you cross the Massachusetts/New York border. Merge onto I-90 West via Exit 1B towards Albany/US-9/Hudson. Merge onto I-787 South via Exit 6A. Merge onto US-9 North via Exit 4B toward Clinton Ave, At the end of the ramp turn right onto Broadway. Turn right onto Spencer St. Right onto Montgomery St. At the end of the street the municipal parking lot is on your left and the Visitors Center is in the large brick building on your right.

From the West: Take I-90 east to Exit 6A Rensselaer/Albany. Merge onto US-9 North via Exit 4B toward Clinton Ave. At the end of the ramp turn right onto Broadway. Turn right onto Spencer St. Right onto Montgomery St. At the end of the street the municipal parking lot is on your left and the Visitors Center is in the large brick building on your right.

Course Description: These walks will take you along downtown/uptown city streets, the Capitol & Rockefeller Plaza, and the 10K route will continue through the beautiful Washington Park. Henry Hudson first claimed this area for the Dutch in 1609. Fur traders established the first European settlement in 1614. Albany was officially chartered as a city in 1686. It succeeded as the Capital of New York State in 1797. It is one of the oldest surviving settlements from the original 13 colonies, and the longest continuously chartered city in the United States. Modern Albany was founded as Dutch trading posts, Fort Nassau, in 1614 and then Fort Orange in 1624. The fur trade brought in a population that settled around Fort Orange and founded a village called Beverwijck (not Beaverwijck). The English took over and renamed the town Albany in 1664. The city was officially chartered in 1686 with the issuance of the Dongan Charter, the oldest effective city charter in the nation and possibly the longest-running instrument of municipal government in the Western Hemisphere.

ALBANY CAPITAL HISTORICAL WALK, NY – 6K

- 1. Leave Visitors' Center, TR (Turn Right) to Broadway & TL (Turn Left). Go to corner TR (Turn Right) to crosswalk.** (At Visitor Center ask to see 15 min. Albany slideshow. Quackenbush House on L- (Left), 1736 is oldest Dutch building in Albany; probably made bricks here.)
- 2. Cross Broadway, TL then cross Clinton; go 2 ½- blocks (crossing Van Tromp, & Columbia) to small park on R (Right).** (Across Broadway on L- are: NYS Environmental Conservation Dept., 2001, & old Union Station, 1900, Albany's railroad station, restored 1986, to be a bank.)
- 3. At park, bear R to enter Tricentennial Park.** (Monument – Great Seal for City of Albany: beaver pelts; Hudson's "Half Moon"; Native American & Dutchman.)
- 4. QUESTION #1: What is large word on monument of Albany's seal meaning "constant personal attention"?**
- 5. Leave Tricentennial Park by back, L-corner to Steuben St. (a pedestrian mall). Go up 1-block to North Pearl St.**
- 6. At N. Pearl St., TR. Go 4-blocks to Orange St., (next street past Van Tromp St.)** (At Orange St., look L-front at Palace Theater, 1931, now home of Albany Symphony. Look L- at present location of 3rd structure for "First Church" in Albany, 'Dutch' Reformed, 1798, organized 1642. Oldest pulpit in America; purchased in 1656 from Amsterdam, The Netherlands for 25 beaver skins.)
- 7. At Orange St., TL & cross N. Pearl St. to "First Church" (Dutch Reformed); TL. Follow N. Pearl St. back about 3-blocks again to Steuben St. pedestrian mall.** (On R is former Kenmore Hotel, 1878, has "Rain-Bo Room", 1921, favorite haunt of the notorious gangster "Legs" Diamond. Building renovated 1986 to office space.)
- 8. At Steuben St., TR. Go up pedestrian mall 2-blocks to Lodge St.; TL. (1K) Go 3-blocks to State St.** (On Lodge St the 3rd structure, 1867, is oldest Roman Catholic Church in Albany, St. Mary's, founded 1797. If no event is going on, look inside at restoration. At the corner of State St. is St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 1859, organized 1712. Inside, entombed body British Gen. Lord Howe - French & Indian War, 1754-63; many Tiffany stained glass windows.) Note gargoyles around tower of St Peters. (Walking With the Wild Things)
- At State St., TR. Go up State St. hill 1-block to Eagle St.; TR. Go 2-blocks to Pine St.** (At Eagle St., Capitol straight ahead near west gate of Ft. Frederick, 1698. On Eagle St. note City Hall, 1882, constructed of brownstone & granite; 60 bell Carillon tower & clocks. Enter lobby to see building's atrium. (Town Halls/City Halls))
- 9. At Pine St., carefully cross & immediately TL; cross Eagle St. & bear L-. Go just to 1st-walkway on Right. Enter Albany Park.** (On Eagle St. building north of City Hall is NYS Court of Appeals, 1841 - State's highest court. Ask to view interior, which some claim is most beautiful court in Nation. Next is Albany County Courthouse, 1916.)
- 10. Take walkway to large stone building.** (Now Albany Bd. of Ed. was private boys' Albany Academy, 1813, attended by Herman Melville – Moby Dick, & Joseph Henry, who later taught physics here. At this place Henry discovered electricity could be generated by passing magnet through coil of wire - electric dynamo. Henry's Monument is near front of building, as is the international "Peace Pole" written in 6-languages, "May Peace Prevail on Earth")
- 11. Continue along building's L-side to large (Albany's) Vietnam Memorial** (built by those veterans). **At Memorial, bear L-uphill to corner of Washington Ave & N. Hawk St. At this corner, bear L to cross Washington Ave. At side of State Capitol, TR. Walk up to 1st-walkway on L & enter small park. Keeping Capitol on L-continue along curved walkway across Park to State St.** (Gen. Geo. Washington, while touring Mohawk Valley, 1783-84, came into Albany on a dirt-road that now bears his name – Washington Ave. Across Washington Ave is NYS Ed Building; when opened in 1912, considered one of 12-most beautiful buildings in World. Its frontage has 36-Corinthian columns, 660', is longest colonnade in US & maybe World. 1st-major government building constructed for sole purpose of education; \$4M. Restored in 1980's-90's. At far end of Park is life-size statue of Gen. Washington, & Alfred E. Smith State Office Building.)
- 12. At State St. TL. Follow sidewalk down to 1st-crosswalk, TR & carefully cross State St.** (At this side entrance of Capitol, check inside for tour times.) (2K)

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13. **Enter Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza. Go ahead up ramp or steps & continue to near-end of long segmented water pools; view buildings.** (In winter, near pool is skating rink. At L-rear Judicial Building; on L “The Egg”, a unique structure containing 2-performing arts theaters (*Step to the Beat*); Corning Tower, 42-stories, 587’, highest structure between NYC/Montreal; straight ahead Cultural Education Building, housing State Library, Archives, & Museum composed of many permanent & short term exhibits; home of Archaeological, Biological, & Geological Surveys, third oldest in world; along R-side, 4 Agency towers of cantilever construction; low ¼ mi long building just for motor vehicle registration; R-rear is Legislative Office, & Capitol. Complex built 1965-76 for excess \$1.7B. Facility has world’s largest collection of modern art not housed in a museum: 92 sculptures, paintings, & tapestries. More art will be seen later in the Plaza & within complex along the Concourse.)
14. **Facing pools, TL; walk bearing a bit L-around low stone wall; go past NYS Fallen Firefighters Memorial.** (Tap on a firefighter’s hat for sound.)
15. **Continue on to another wall that overlooks part of City & Hudson River; TR. Continue along wall to Tower; TR & go towards pools.** (Observation floor may be open; check inside for going up to view.)
16. **On walkway at pools, TL. With Capitol at your back, continue to end of Plaza. (Just Look Back: View Plaza with Capitol.) Take steps down to Madison Ave; TL. Continue down Madison 1-whole block to Eagle St; TR. Cross Madison Ave.; at Cathedral, TR (1852).** (Undergoing \$11M restoration. Mediaeval style lead-roofs will need replacement in 300 yrs.)
17. **Go up ½-block to WWII Memorial on L; enter & circle it. (3K)** (WWII Memorial has many symbolisms: Eagle in attack position protecting World; R-pool Atlantic Ocean; L-pool is Pacific, both in turmoil represented by moving water, if fountain on. Ocean’s major battles/dates inscribed around fountain.) (*Walking with America’s Veterans*)
18. **QUESTION #2: At World War II Memorial, which two persons are quoted on backside of monument?**
19. **Return to Madison Ave, TL & go under bridge. (Restrooms on L in State Museum.) Continue going up just past end of Museum building; bear-L to walkway in small park (Purple Heart Monument). Go into park, bear-R to Women Veterans Memorial; follow walkway up to next level, Korean War Memorial. Pass it & leave Park onto Madison Ave.**
20. **Back at Madison Ave., TL. Go up rest of this block to Swan St. (Just Look Left: See eternal flame memorial on knoll – NYS Missing Persons Remembrance.) At this corner of Swan St. & Madison Ave, TR. Cross Madison Ave.**
21. **After crossing Madison Ave., TR, facing downhill. (NOTE: Persons doing 10K route would depart at this location in a different direction – L uphill.) 6-Kers go downhill toward overhead bridge at Museum.** (Note playground on your left after passing first building. (*Par for the Course*)). **Under bridge, enter glass doors on L. Take stairs & stay on R-side; go ¾ length of the long Concourse.** (See modern art.) **Restrooms/Water available in side-corridors.**
22. **On R, entrance sign for corridor to “THE EGG” (opposite Box Office, but before Security Station TR. Pass through 1st-set of glass doors toward “The Egg”. Before 2nd set of glass doors, TL (then TR) keeping glass-walls on your R. Pass through next set of glass doors (“MVP Arena Walkway”) (“crash-bar” at extreme R); immediately TL. Exit through glass doors (“crash-bar”) to outdoors. Pass State’s Vietnam War Memorial out towards State St.**
23. **At State St., bear L (Capitol building to L-front). Use nearest crosswalk to carefully cross State St. (4K) Take walkway in Park that leads down to Monument of Gen. Philip Sheridan mounted on horse.** (Gen. Sheridan, not to be confused with Sherman of “Atlanta to the Sea”, was one of most celebrated Civil War heroes who spent his boyhood in Albany. It was Sheridan’s cavalry forces that defeated Gen. Robert E. Lee at Appomattox Station, VA resulting in Army of Virginia surrender at Appomattox Court House, April 9, 1865. This NYS Capitol building was started in 1865, took 30 yrs. to complete & cost \$25M, one of the last made entirely of masonry. It is one of only eight-US state capitols without a dome.

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- 24. With Sheridan Monument at your back (looking down State St. hill), bear R-downward to walkway at corner of State St. Using traffic signals, cross to a small pedestrian island, bear L then continue over Eagle St. to R-side of State St. hill.**
- 25. Continue downward all the way to bottom of State St. at “T” intersection with Broadway. Directly ahead, at crosswalk on Broadway, with traffic lights, cross Broadway onto a large circle of stonework “SUNY”.** (This 13-story curved ornate building (1915) has at its top a huge working copper weathervane (8’ tall; 800 lbs.), scale model of Henry Hudson’s ship, Half Moon, which first sailed these waters in 1609. The building, made in Flemish Gothic style, is 660 ft. long with 1,122 windows. It originally was headquarters for Delaware & Hudson Railroad, designed to help hide bustling activities of factories & ships along Hudson River behind it. It is now home of State University of NY, Central Administration for all 64 campuses of the largest university system in US.) **(See:** Just beyond this circle on top of stone-edging of grassy plaza contains series of 4-plaques commemorating some historic events in Albany: Henry Hudson landing 1609; Albany Congress/Convention 1754; British Gen. Burgoyne & his troops marched past this site on way to Boston after their surrender at Battle of Saratoga, Oct. 17, 1777; Robert Fulton’s “Clermont” steamship port. Also, Ben Franklin arrived by sloop from NYC, April 1776 on unsuccessful mission to Montreal to encourage Canada to become our 14th colony.
- 26. From “SUNY” circle with Broadway at your L-side, walk 1-block to end of long white-building (US Court House). At your L there is a pole with green sign: “Riverfront & Trail” with arrow; TR. (5K) Go up the stairs to “Hudson River Way”. Cross bridge to end stopping at large granite-block with map.** (Hudson River flows from L - Adirondack Mts., to R - NYC & Atlantic Ocean. Albany is 150 mi. to Ocean but there are 5 ft. tides but still fresh water. Boat docks float up/down with tides. Is tide in or out now? Look for shore beach on far side. This Amphitheater is site for entertainment events & fireworks over River. When I-787 built in 1960's, Albany was separated from her River. The \$9 million Bridge you crossed now makes the reconnection. This site is Corning Preserve: the paved path below is part of the longest multi-use bike & hike trail in country, 750 mi., “Empire State Trail”.)
- 27. At granite map, Turn-Around & start back over bridge stopping at 1st-large group of 135-pinkish “bricks” in floor to get answer to the last Question.**
- 28. QUESTION #3: Within this group of 135-bricks, find the 8th-brick in from R-side & 4th-up from bottom. What 2-word phrase is made by brick’s sponsors?**
- 29. Cross bridge. Return to Broadway & TR. With Broadway on your L-side, go about 4-long blocks to Visitors’ Center. (6K)**

AFTER YOUR EVENT: Be sure to log back into the OSB system to 'finish/complete' your online registration after doing the event. The OSB system does not deduct any event fee from a participant's Event Bank until they have submitted event completion info including the date of the event, the distance, and the selection of applicable Special Programs that person is participating in. (Nevertheless, a fee of \$2 for a downloaded PDF is deducted from the user's Event Bank when the PDF is downloaded. Later, any PDF fees are credited back to a user's Event Bank when he/she submits the event completion info as a paying-for-credit participant. Note, however, the \$2 coupon for the downloaded PDF will expire in 60 days.) Also note that an event registration expires after 30 days, but if your registrations lapses, you may re-register without cost.

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21. **Go into park, bear-R to Women Veterans Memorial; follow walkway up to next level, Korean War Memorial. Pass it & leave Park onto Madison Ave.**
22. **Back at Madison Ave., TL. Go up rest of this block to Swan St. (Just Look Left: See eternal flame memorial on knoll – NYS Missing Persons Remembrance.) At this corner of Swan St. & Madison Ave, TR. Cross Madison Ave.**
23. **After crossing Madison Ave., TL, facing uphill, (NOTE: Persons doing 6K route would depart at this location in a different direction – R, downhill.) Cross Swan St. Continue straight, uphill on R-side of Madison Ave, crossing Dove, Delaware/Lark Sts, & short block to Willett St.**
24. **At Willet St., (4K) carefully cross a combined intersection of Willet St & a “park road”. Immediately bear R onto a dirt path into Washington Park. (Just Look Right: Across park road to monument for Sgt. W. Henry Johnson, WWI African American soldier who, for his outstanding service in 1915, was finally awarded the Medal of Honor by Pres. Obama.)**
25. **At the 1st-intersection, a wider pathway, TR & carefully cross roadway using the crosswalk onto “The Promenade” (a wide pathway lined with benches).** (You are in Washington Park, Albany’s largest & oldest, 1806. Originally, this eastern end of Park was open space & served for many years as city’s parade ground, principally a drill field, & was location of a botanical garden, county fairs, skating rink, & ball fields. The western end of the Park, plus an extended area, was a burial ground from 1800 which was later moved to Albany Rural. In 1868, foremost landscape architects of the country Fredrick Law Olmsted & Calvert Vaux saw this area of meadows as having possibility of a lake and pastoral scenery, which they created. Popularity of cars during 20th Century seriously affected the Park, causing natural environment to become more urban, such as roadways into Park, some of which are now being reclaimed. – by *Washington Park Conservancy*.)

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26. After crossing roadway, go to 2nd dirt path, TL; follow path downward to large statue of Moses atop “King Memorial Fountain”.
(Note: See the other 4-statues depicting stages of life - infancy, teen, middle age, & elder. Which are you? Monument based on Bible when God directed Moses to strike the rocks & water would flow. The memorial is 29’ high; Moses statue 10’ tall; rocks came from “Old Stone King Mt.” along Hudson River. From spring to fall in this Park, there is a constant rotation of seasonal flowers in an array of beds that draws large crowds, especially when tulips emerge again in spring to display Albany’s Dutch Heritage.)
27. At Fountain facing downhill with Moses at your back, take dirt/concrete roadway downward, bearing L to cross a paved roadway, onto a dirt trail along the shoreline that circles lake (1873).
28. At lake-trail, TL & follow trail clockwise to a bridge; TR (1875; restoration 2013-15). Cross on bridge to a roadway; TR. Follow this roadway with lake on R-towards large Lake House – (if open, Rest Rooms). If no stage performance going on, cross in front of Lake House’s stage (with tiered seating area on L) (5K). Continue onto the dirt lake-trail ahead. (If there is stage show happening, enter Lake House’s 1st-door & go through to exit door at back; TL. Follow walkway along back & side of building back onto lake-trail at right; TR.) (In summer months, Albany sponsors a variety of daytime/evenings stage plays for children & families; the tiered seating area is complementary.)
29. Continue on lake-trail only as far as where you first entered this lake-trail; TL. Leave lake-trail, cross roadway & go uphill back to statue of Moses.
30. At Moses, go around to backside &, with statue at your back, take dirt path back uphill to “The Promenade”; TL. Follow “The Promenade” to its end at “Soldiers & Sailors” Monument. Bear L-around its end to crosswalk over a park roadway. Continue out to State St; TR. (Monument, 1912 – “..to memorialize those from Albany who served in Civil War, 1861-65”).
31. On State St’s R-side, go 1-block passing Willett Rock on R; cross Willett St; TR. On Willett St., go 1-block to Lancaster St; TL. (6K) (Col. Marinus Willett in many battles – French & Indian War & Am. Revolution.)
32. On Lancaster St, (carefully crossing Lark & Dove Sts.- no STOP signs.); go 3-long blocks downhill to a “T” with Swan St. TR. (The large marble building ahead, ¼ mi long, is part of the Rockefeller Plaza & administers NYS motor vehicle info.)
33. Keeping large marble building on L, cross Lancaster St., Jay St., (no signs) & follow the narrow, curved section of sidewalk to Hudson St. (Hudson-Jay Park on R). Continue straight & uphill crossing Hudson, then Hamilton Sts. to Madison Ave; TL. Carefully cross Swan St. (7K)
34. After crossing Swan St., go downhill toward overhead bridge at Museum.(Note playground on your left after passing first building. (Par for the Course). Under bridge, enter glass doors on L. Take stairs & stay on R-side; go ¾ length of the long Concourse. (See modern art.) Restrooms/Water available in side-corridors.
35. On R, entrance sign for corridor to “THE EGG” (opposite Box Office, but before Security Station), TR. Pass through 1st-set of glass doors toward The Egg. Before 2nd set of glass doors, TL (then R) keeping glass-walls on your R. Pass through next set of glass doors (“MVP Arena Walkway”) (“crash-bar” at extreme R); immediately TL. Exit through glass doors (“crash-bar”) to outdoors. Pass State’s Vietnam War Memorial out towards State St.

43. Cross bridge. Return to Broadway & TR (9K). With Broadway on your L-side go about 4-long blocks to Visitors’ Center.

AFTER YOUR EVENT: Be sure to log back into the OSB system to 'finish/complete' your online registration after doing the event. The OSB system does not deduct any event fee from a participant's Event Bank until they have submitted event completion info including the date of the event, the distance, and the selection of applicable Special Programs that person is participating in. (Nevertheless, a fee of \$2 for a downloaded PDF is deducted from the user's Event Bank when the PDF is downloaded. Later, any PDF fees are credited back to a user's Event Bank when he/she submits the event completion info as a paying-for-credit participant. Note, however, the \$2 coupon for the downloaded PDF will expire in 60 days.) Also note that an event registration expires after 30 days, but if your registrations lapses, you may re-register without cost.
