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NORTH KNOXVILLE – 4TH & GILL

This is another side of this southern city. The Old North Knoxville and 4th and Gill neighborhoods were developed in the late 19th and early 20th centuries and have been undergoing a resurgence the last 20 years or so. Highlights on the walks include the Old Gray and National cemeteries, Happy Holler, the 2017 HGTV Urban Oasis home, the "Visit Knoxville" mural, and Greystone - home of WATE Channel 6. In addition, there are a plethora of breweries, restaurants, coffee shops and even a food truck park along the way. There are limited restrooms in businesses along route. Pets must be on a leash and are not generally allowed in businesses.

STARTING POINT & PARKING

The starting point for both of the distances for this event is at the parking lot at Emory Place which runs between North Central Street and North Broadway. Best address for use in GPS is 6 Emory Place (The Crafty Bastard Brewery). This address is just for reference as parking should be on the street in any available unreserved space.

Directions:

From East: From I-40W take Exit 389 for Hall of Fame Dr. toward US-441N/Broadway. Take E 5th Ave to Emory Place

From West: From I-40E take Exit 387 toward TN-62/17th St/Western Ave. Merge onto Dale Ave NW. Straight onto Blackstock Ave. Right onto W 5th Ave. Left onto N Broadway. R onto Emory Place

GENERAL WALK INFORMATION

There are no restrooms at the start of this walk. However, there are potential restroom stops along the route, but very limited. Pets must be on a leash and are not generally allowed in businesses. Lots of microbreweries, restaurants, coffee shops, and even a food truck park. This walk is generally on city sidewalks. It should be easy for strollers and wheelchairs.

1. Walk **west** on Emory Place toward the large church building (St. John's Lutheran Church).
2. *St. John's was completed and dedicated in 1912 and was the first English-language Lutheran congregation in Knoxville.*
3. Carefully cross North Broadway (no crosswalk) to Tyson Street and continue **straight (west)** on Tyson. You will pass **Old Gray Cemetery** and **Knoxville National Cemetery (Walking With America's Veterans)** on your left.
4. *Old Gray Cemetery is the 2nd-oldest cemetery in Knoxville and is the resting place of many prominent Knoxvilleians. Knoxville National Cemetery was created during the Civil War to provide a resting place for Union dead.*
5. **TURN RIGHT** on Bernard Avenue to North Central Street. *Across North Central is the Central Filling Station Food Truck Park, which is open on weekends nine months out of the year.*
6. **TURN LEFT** on North Central Street to East Oklahoma Avenue.
7. *The 1200 block of N Central Street is known as "Happy Holler". The Depression-era moniker reflects the area's early popularity as the place to go to buy alcohol during prohibition. It's heyday lasted from about 1909 through 1961. It is now enjoying a renaissance, with several new businesses occupying the original buildings.*
8. **TURN RIGHT** on East Oklahoma Avenue until it dead-ends into Folsom Avenue.
9. *This neighborhood, known as "Old North Knoxville", became a "streetcar suburb" in 1889. In the pre-automobile era, the neighborhood boasted wide sidewalks built so residents could walk to the streetcar and commute to jobs and markets downtown. The neighborhood's houses exemplify the architecture of the late 1800's to the early 1920's. Victorian, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Eastlake, Bungalow, Shotgun and Folk-style homes can be seen along these streets.*
10. About 2 and 2/3 blocks along East Oklahoma on the right is the Old North Knoxville Park (**Little Free Libraries**).
11. **TURN LEFT** on East Folsom to West Glenwood Avenue NE (extremely short block).
12. **TURN RIGHT** on West Glenwood Avenue NE to Armstrong Avenue.
13. **TURN RIGHT** on Armstrong Avenue to Wells Avenue.
14. **TURN LEFT** on Wells Avenue to North Broadway
10. **CAREFULLY** cross North Broadway. K-Brew Coffee should be in front of you on the SE corner of Wells Avenue and North Broadway. Restrooms are available during business hours. Please consider purchasing a drink or snack if using their restrooms.
11. **TURN RIGHT** on North Broadway, passing K-Brew Coffee and a large retail building.

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Turn around to see the "Visit Knoxville" mural on the south side of the retail building.

12. TURN RIGHT on North Broadway, retracing your steps past K-Brew and across Wells Avenue, continuing north to E Glenwood Avenue.

13. *"Greystone" at 1306 N Broadway was constructed in 1885 as a residence for Major Eldad Cicero Camp and his family. Major Camp was an officer in the Union army during the Civil War and later president of two coal companies and one of the wealthiest men in East Tennessee. WATE Channel 6 purchased the home in 1962 and uses it for their offices.*

14. TURN RIGHT on East Glenwood Avenue to Luttrell Street.

15. *You and now entering the "Fourth and Gill" neighborhood. It was also developed during the late 19th century and several prominent figures called this area home during its early history. Local architects George F. Barber and the Baumann brothers designed a number of homes in the neighborhood.*

16. TURN RIGHT on Luttrell Street to Gill Avenue. 1210 Luttrell Street (on your left) was the 2017 HGTV Urban Oasis Giveaway Home.

17. TURN LEFT on Gill Avenue to Eleanor St.

18. TURN RIGHT on Eleanor Street to Third Ave.

19. TURN RIGHT on Third Avenue to Lamar St.

20. TURN RIGHT on Lamar Street to North Broadway.

21. TURN LEFT on North Broadway to North Central Street.

22. TURN LEFT on North Central Street to **the finish** on Emory Place.

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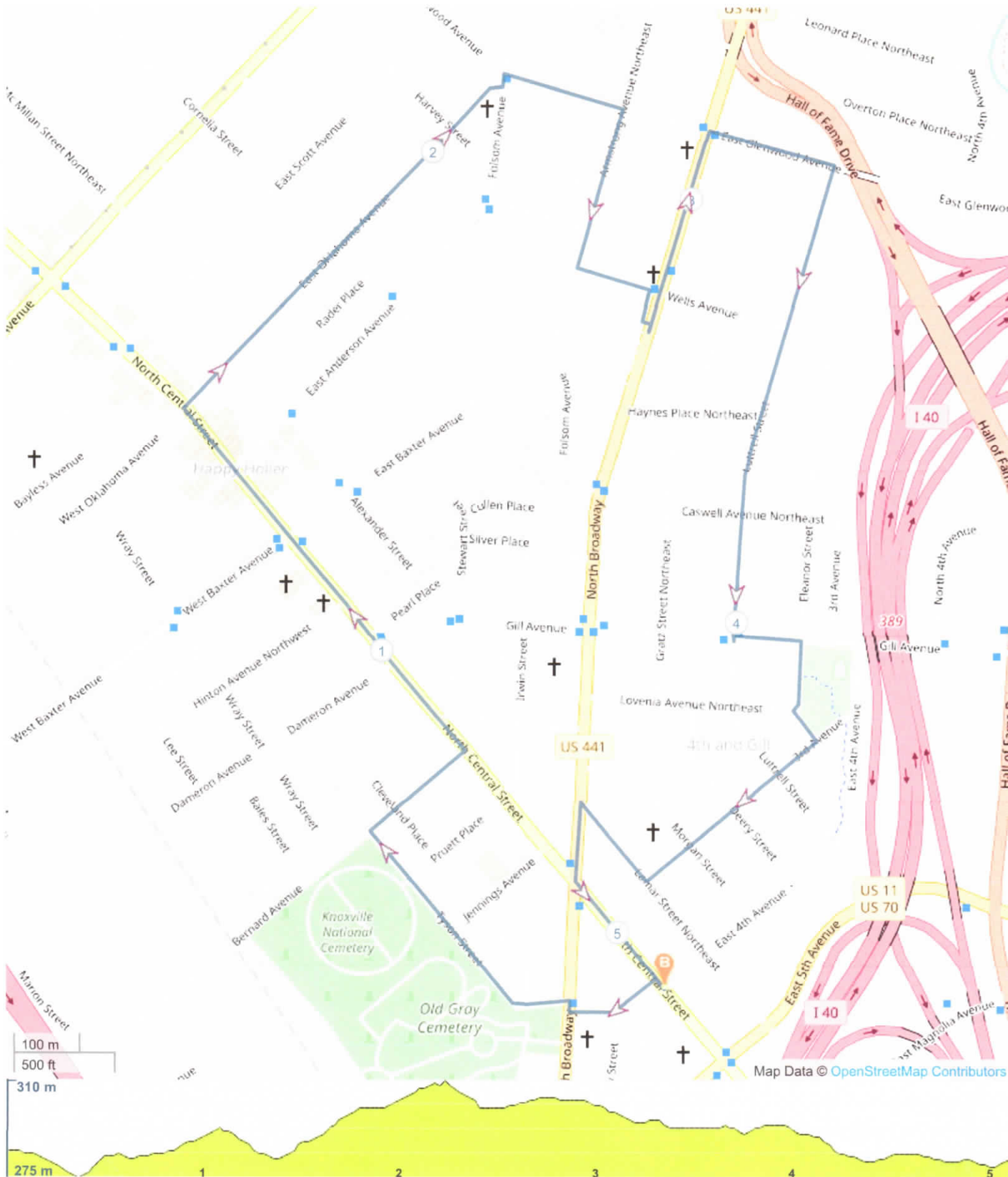

10 KM Walk Rated 1A Y 2752

- 1. START** on Emory Place. Walk **west** on Emory Place toward N. Broadway with the large church building (St. John's Lutheran Church) on your left
- 2. St. John's was completed and dedicated in 1912 and was the first English-language Lutheran congregation in Knoxville.*
- Carefully cross North Broadway (no crosswalk) and turn **LEFT** to the entrance to Old Gray Cemetery on the right. Enter the cemetery.
- 4. Old Gray Cemetery is the 2nd-oldest cemetery in Knoxville and is the resting place of many prominent Knoxvilleians. It also contains many examples of Victorian funereal art.*
- 5. Take the FIRST RIGHT** in the cemetery. The road will turn to the left as you walk. At the T-intersection go **LEFT**, then continue uphill to the first **RIGHT** (the circle going around the fountain), then **RIGHT** again to the cemetery exit.
- 6. TURN LEFT** on North Broadway to Tyson Street.
- 7. TURN LEFT** on Tyson Street and continue past **Old Gray Cemetery** on your left to the entrance to **Knoxville National Cemetery (Walking With America's Veterans)** on your left.
- 8. Knoxville National Cemetery was created during the Civil War to provide a resting place for Union war casualties.*
- 9. TURN LEFT** into Knoxville National Cemetery and take the first left. Continue around the circular path until you return to the entrance.
- 10. The grave of General Robert Reese Neyland will be on your left in the row closest to the street a very short distance after turning onto the circular drive. Neyland holds the record for most wins in Tennessee football history with 173 wins in 216 games, six undefeated seasons, nine undefeated regular seasons, seven conference championships, and four national championships. At UT, he reeled off undefeated streaks of 33, 28, 23, 19, and 14 games. Neyland Stadium is named in his honor.*
- 11.** Exit the cemetery, turning **LEFT** on Tyson St to Bernard Avenue.
- 12. TURN RIGHT** on Bernard Avenue to North Central Street. *Across North Central is the Central Filling Station Food Truck Park, which is open on weekends nine months out of the year.*
- 13. TURN LEFT** on North Central Street (6 blocks) to East Scott Avenue (not marked but there is a Kenjo Market on the NE corner of the intersection).
- 14. The 1200 block of N Central Street is known as "Happy Holler". The Depression-era moniker reflects the area's early popularity as the place to go to buy alcohol during prohibition. Its heyday lasted from about 1909 through 1961. It is now enjoying a renaissance, with several new businesses occupying the original buildings.*

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- 15. TURN RIGHT** on East Scott Avenue until it dead-ends into Kenyon Street.
- 16.** *This neighborhood, known as “Old North Knoxville,” was developed as a “streetcar suburb” in the late 19th century. In the pre-automobile era, the neighborhood boasted wide sidewalks built so residents could walk to the streetcar line and commute to jobs and markets downtown. The neighborhood’s houses exemplify the architecture of the late 1800’s to the early 1920’s. Victorian, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Eastlake, Bungalow, Shotgun and Folk-style homes can be seen along these streets.*
- 17. TURN RIGHT** on Kenyon Street to Armstrong Avenue.
- 18.** *Note the grooved pavement on Kenyon Street. This circa-1907 “Granitoid” surface is also known as “singing pavement” for the sound it makes when cars drive over it.*
- 19. TURN RIGHT** on Armstrong Avenue to Harvey Street.
- 20. TURN RIGHT** on Harvey Street to East Oklahoma.
- 21. TURN LEFT** on East Oklahoma to Alexander Street. A very short distance down East Oklahoma on your left is the Old North Knoxville Park (**Little Free Libraries**).
- 22. TURN LEFT** on Alexander Street to E Anderson Avenue.
- 23. TURN LEFT** on East Anderson Avenue to Kern Place.
- 24. TURN RIGHT** on Kern Place to Armstrong Avenue.
- 25. TURN RIGHT** on Armstrong Avenue to Wells Avenue.
- 26. TURN LEFT** on Wells Avenue to North Broadway
- 27. CAREFULLY** cross North Broadway. K-Brew Coffee should be in front of you on the SE corner of Wells Avenue and North Broadway. Restrooms are available during business hours. Please consider purchasing a drink or snack if using their restrooms.
- 28. TURN RIGHT** on North Broadway, passing K-Brew Coffee and a large retail building on your left. *Turn around to see the “Visit Knoxville” mural on the south side of the retail building.*
- 29. After viewing the mural TURN AROUND** on North Broadway, retracing your steps past K-Brew and across Wells Avenue, continuing north to E Glenwood Avenue.
- 30.** *“Greystone” at 1306 N Broadway was constructed in 1885 as a residence for Major Eldad Cicero Camp and his family. Major Camp was an officer in the Union army during the Civil War and later president of two coal companies and one of the wealthiest men in East Tennessee. WATE Channel 6 purchased the home in 1962 and now uses it for their offices.*
- 31. TURN RIGHT** on East Glenwood Avenue to Luttrell Street.

- 33. TURN RIGHT** on Luttrell Street to Haynes Place.

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34. *1210 Luttrell Street (on your left) was the 2017 HGTV Urban Oasis Giveaway Home.*
35. **TURN RIGHT** on Haynes Place to Gratz Street. [Note that Gratz is off-set left and right]
36. **TURN LEFT** on Gratz Street to Lovenia Avenue.
37. **TURN LEFT** on Lovenia Avenue back to Luttrell Street.
38. **TURN LEFT** on Luttrell Street to Caswell Avenue.
39. **TURN RIGHT** on Caswell Avenue to Eleanor Street.
40. **TURN RIGHT** on Eleanor Street to 3rd Avenue. [Note that Eleanor jogs left at Lovenia Ave.]
41. **TURN RIGHT** on 3rd Ave (4blocks) to Lamar Street.
42. **TURN RIGHT** on Lamar Street to North Broadway.
43. **TURN RIGHT** on North Broadway to first left (carefully cross street - no crosswalk) on Bearden Place.
44. **TURN LEFT** on Bearden Place to North Central.
45. **TURN LEFT** on North Central to cross N. Broadway.
46. **TURN LEFT** to cross N. Central and then **TURN RIGHT** to continue along N. Central to East 3rd Avenue.
47. **TURN LEFT** on East 3rd Ave.
48. **TURN RIGHT** on Lamar Street and go two blocks to East 5th Avenue.
49. **TURN RIGHT** on East 5th Avenue and go one block back to North Central.
50. *The building on your right is the old Knoxville High School that operated from 1910-1951. Notable individuals who attended Knoxville High are James Agee, Clarence Brown, Mary Costa, Patricia Neal and John Cullum. It has now been converted into an independent living facility. Note the "Doughboy" statue in front of the facility. It was erected in 1921 to honor the 201 former students and faculty who died during WWI.*
51. **TURN RIGHT** on North Central to finish at Emory Place.

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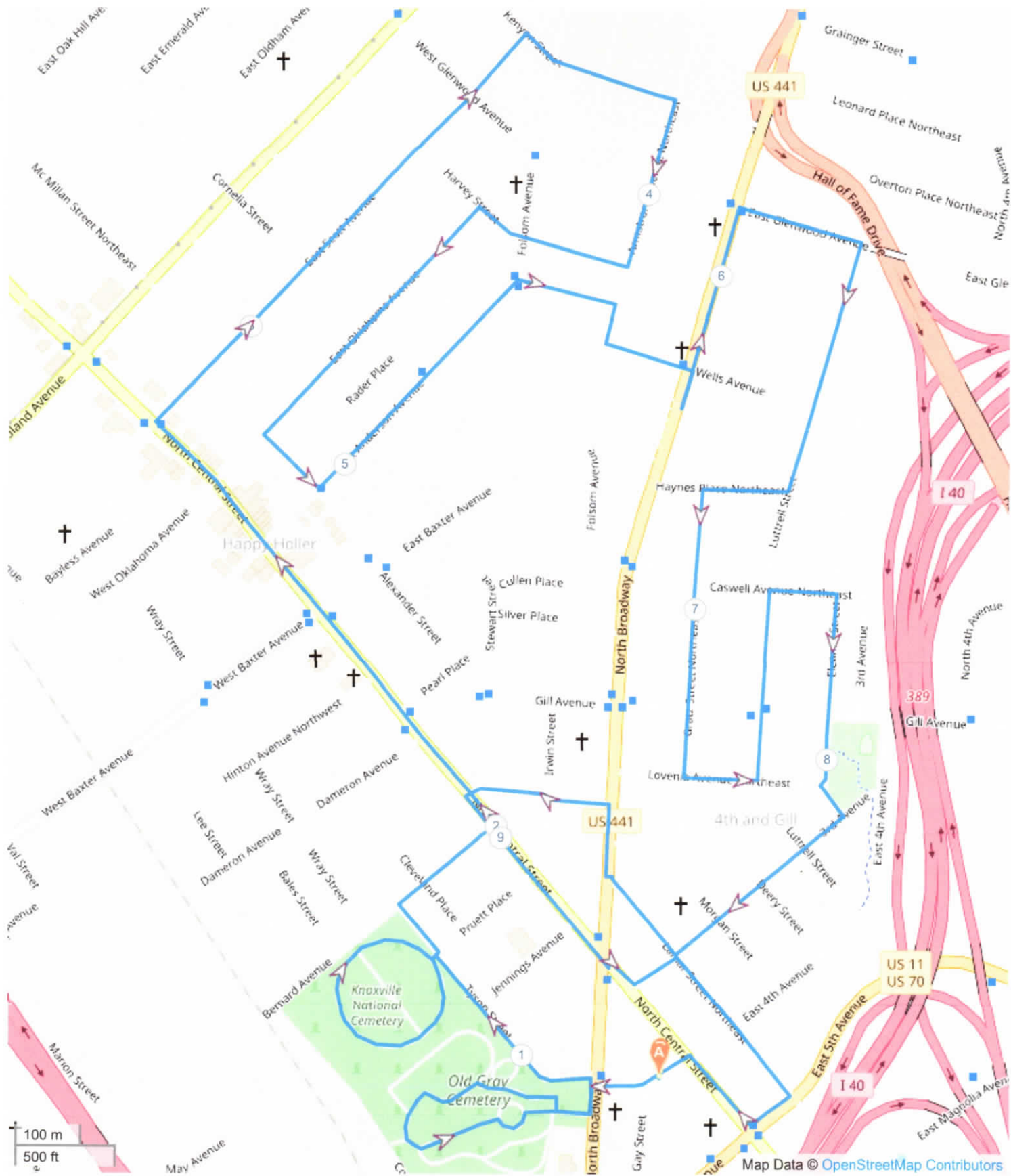
